One member's voice

On my way to a spiritual awakening A story of experience, strength, and hope

Step Four: *Made a searching and fearless moral inventory of ourselves.*

The Fourth Step of the program of Alcoholics Anonymous contains two very important words: *searching* and *fearless*.

Searching told me that I must look deeply into my life, and when I did, I discovered that often I had overlooked a lot of things. For example, I would not like to think of myself as a gossip, so I say, "I am only telling you this about him to keep you from being hurt."

I say, "I never steal," but did I ever waste time when I was supposed to be working and getting paid for it? In Step Four, I realized I needed to look more deeply into the motivation for my actions.

In the rooms of AA, I've heard many acronyms. HOW—honesty, openness, and willingness — is one of them. I look at my life

and try my best to be *honest* about what I have done, *open* in the sense that I don't attribute false motives to my actions, and I do all this *willingly*.

Another important word used in Step Four is **Fearless**. Faith is the antithesis of fear. I think it is important to realize that faith is a gift from my Higher Power. Whatever my concept of the HP is, I get well only through the relationship with my Higher Power that is built up by the progressive action of the steps.

For example, in Step Two, I "came to believe..." This belief becomes faith, which eliminates fear to a greater and greater extent. It is a scary thing to look at my life on my own, but with the grace of the Higher Power, I can make this searching and fearless inventory in Step Four and proceed to work the other steps.

I proceed with my program knowing that I

Tradition Four Respecting the spirit of the tradition

Each group should be autonomous except in matters affecting other groups or A.A. as a whole.

THE FOURTH TRADITION (LONG FORM)

With respect to its own affairs, each AA group should be responsible to no other authority than its own conscience. But when its plans concern the welfare of neighboring groups also, those groups ought to be consulted. And no group, regional committee, or individual should ever take any action that might greatly affect AA as a whole without conferring with the trustees of the General Service Board. On such issues our common welfare is paramount.

Wow, what a mouthful! But very descriptive. We in Marion County can be very proud of the brand of AA practiced here. Recently a local group decided to start a speaker meeting and serve ice cream, have a good speaker, and great fellowship on the last Friday of the month.

Give away free ice cream at an AA meeting, and we all know what will happen. This group also knew that another local group observed their birthday night on the last Friday of the month as well. Rather than create a

conflict between the two, the group decided to have its ice cream social on another night. That is the essence of Tradition Four.

I read somewhere that in AA every group has the right to be wrong. Somewhat facetious because who is to say the group is wrong.

Our fellowship mirrors our society and in this fast paced, sometimes rude atmosphere, AA has been inundated by the courts, treatment centers, and publicity with many diversified groups, many of which are

I can look at my life with trust in my Higher Power. I know that whatever comes up from this fearless search, it will help lead to a relationship with my HP and a spiritual awakening.

The first three steps are actually two miracles and then a decision. Having made a decision to turn my will and my life over to the care of God, with a sense of trust, I put Step Three into practice.

Step Four is the beginning of carrying out that decision. I first have to know and admit what my life has been like, and then in the next steps I act on this knowledge. The whole essence of Step Four is to be "into action" to carry out the decision made in Step Three.

Step Four is really the beginning of the action. I am on my way to a spiritual awakening, a relationship with my Higher Power—I am getting well.

The idea for organizing an historical collection of the Fellowship's records came from AA co-founder Bill W. in the early 1950s. His far-reaching vision outlined an archival message that is still sound today. Historical records help us to sift through our day-to-day experience in recovery and reach back for the shared experience from the past.

I am responsible. One member's view of AA's Future.

The following letter, written by our Area Alternate Delegate to the AA World Services General Service Conference, appeared in the March issue of the newsletter of Nature Coast Intergroup, Inverness. The message can serve as inspiration to all.

To the Editor:

I was overwhelmed with sadness when I read in the [Nature Coast] Journal that our [Nature Coast] Intergroup Store will close on April 1st.

I just returned from the Delegates Get-Together in Atlanta, where I heard our S.E. Regional Trustee give the latest General Service Board Report. AA World Services & Grapevine are suffering from decreasing contributions, declining subscriptions, and escalating costs. At our January Assembly, in St. Augustine, Area 14's Financial Report for 2011 showed group contributions were down more than \$12,000.

On the flight back to Florida, I quietly contemplate how I could possibly make a difference in AA's future. I decided I would accept the challenge, not as an Area Officer, but as a member of the fellowship, to do more. As a sober member of this fellowship I decided to not only remember my last drunk, but to recall how much I spent on that

drunk. When I was drinking I always found the money I needed. GSO asks its members to send \$1 for every year of sobriety; I decided to send \$2. They are suggesting \$2 in the basket; I decided to give \$3. They also suggested instead of buying sponsees' & your sponsor a card for their anniversaries, to make a contribution to a service entity. I like that idea and I am going to start practicing that suggestion. I never want the next generation not to have AA.

“I am responsible . . . When anyone, anywhere, reaches out for help, I want the hand of A.A. always to be there. And for that: I am responsible.”

This says it all. I am responsible!
