## Keep the river of life flowing. A story of experience, strength, and hope

Step Ten. "Continued to take personal inventory and when we were wrong promptly admitted it."

The word when in the step makes it clear to me that as a human being, I will continue to make mistakes. There are no saints. We all have our moments — the slip of my tongue or a wrong action or motive because my ego has reared its ugly head or my fear has a grip on me for the moment.

It was a long journey for me to finally arrive at the point where I was truly able to recognize when I was taking my will back and once again running the show. It was not always pleasant for me or those around me.

Sure there were certain behaviors prior to reaching Step 10 that changed by being sober and trying to do the right thing. Cash register honesty, actually working for a liv-

ing, being self-supporting through my own contributions, and trying to be a responsible person.

The crux of the problem was that until I was willing to accept the full implication of the Step Three, I would be left with untreated alcoholism, which I found out through doing the steps was between my ears. When finally I was willing through painful experience to turn all of my life — not just the alcohol problem — over to God's care, then I could make a beginning at putting my finger on the problem, which was of course me and my thinking.

To take personal inventory and know when I was wrong, I had to know the truth about myself, which defects drove me, my motives for which I did or didn't do, how selfishness, dishonesty, and

Nor does it mean that the members of Alcoholics Anonymous now restored as citizens of the world, are going to back away from their individual responsibilities to act as they see right upon issues of our time. As an individual member of Alcoholics Anonymous, I can have opinions.


But when it comes to AA as a whole, this is a different matter. As AA's, we do not enter into public con-

troversy, because we know that our fellowship will perish if we do. We see the survival and spread of Alcoholics Anonymous to be of greater importance than any weight we might collectively lend to other causes. Recovery from alcoholism is life itself to us, and we wish to preserve in full strength our means of survival.

What constitutes outside issues? A question came up at the General Service Conference a few years ago about a current outside issue — the Internet and

social media like Facebook. Does using the Internet and identifying oneself or others as an alcoholic break Tradition 11 anonymity and should the Internet be added to this tradition alongside maintaining "personal anonymity at the level of press, radio, and films?" AA groups voted against such a change. As an individual, I can make my own decision, but it is not an opinion of Alcoholics Anonymous.

Another outside issue relates to prescription medications. We are not physicians, and we do not advise people to take or not take prescribed medications. I believe I can discuss this with someone I sponsor on a private basis, but it is not an opinion of Alcoholics

Anonymous.

The steps tell us "how it works," and the traditions are "why it works." If you're really into finding out how this awesome, inspired organization manages to work where other organizations have failed and disappeared, read your AA history in *Alcoholics Anonymous Comes of Age, Pass It On, and Dr. Bob and the Good Oldtimers*. You will be amazed. It is all of our responsibility to know and pass on the program of Alcoholics Anonymous as it was written and passed on to us. Our children and grandchildren, friends, and families may need the program, and we want it to be there always.

self-centeredness had dominated my life as a result of my fear and self reliance.

It had become clear to me that without God as my director, I would be doomed to repeat the same behaviors, and a change in my character would be out of my reach. I had to launch into a fearless inventory to identify who I truly was. Then and only then might it be possible to do an accurate tenth step. I might then know and recognize what the right thing was and if my motives were the right kind.

When I finished my inventory I told someone my story and was then willing, after seeing how destructive these behaviors were, to have God remove them.

I then branched out into making my amends. The burdens of the past were lifted, and I felt a freedom not known to me before. More than ever, I needed and wanted God in my life.

Now for the first time in my life, the channel was clear and open. Step Ten was now the tool I would use to keep it clear. I have ceased fighting everyone or anything, even alcohol. The most miraculous thing about the tenth step is that the truth about me is revealed to me on a daily basis. When I am wrong or act out of fear or selfishness, the Step

Ten gong goes off in my head, and I can no longer be or act the way I used to and still be free and feel connected to God. I must continue to keep my side of the street clean, watching for dishonest and selfish motives and admitting my faults and accepting people as they are.

I have been granted release — on a daily basis — of my mental obsession to drink alcohol and feel this will continue if I keep about God's business. Thy will not mine be done.

# October by the Books

## STEP TEN

*Continued to take personal inventory and when we were wrong promptly admitted it.*

This thought brings us to Step Ten, which suggests we continue to take a personal inventory and continue to set right any new mistakes as we go along. ...We have entered the world of the Spirit. ...This is not an overnight matter. It should continue for our lifetime. Continue to watch for selfishness, dishonesty, resentment and fear. When these crop up, we ask God at once to remove them. We discuss them with someone immediately and make amends quickly if we have harmed anyone. Then we resolutely turn our thoughts to someone we can help. Love and tolerance of others is our code.

Character defects like gossip sneak into my life when I am not making a constant effort to work the Twelve Steps of Recovery. I need to remind myself that the uniqueness is the blessing of my being, and that applies equally to everyone who crosses my path in life's journey. Today the only inventory I need to take is my own. I'll leave judgment of others to the Final Judge - Divine Providence."

And he well knows that his own life has been made richer, as an extra dividend of giving to another without any demand for a return.

The emphasis on inventory is heavy only because a great many of us have never really acquired the habit of accurate self-appraisal. Once this healthy practice has been groomed, it will be so interesting and profitable that the time it takes won't be missed. For these minutes and sometimes hours spent in self-examination are bound to make all the other hours of our day better and happier. And at length our inventories become a regular part of everyday living, rather than unusual or set apart.

## TRADITION TEN

*Alcoholics Anonymous has no opinion on outside issues; hence the AA name ought never be drawn into public controversy.*

Never since it began has Alcoholics Anonymous been divided by a major controversial issue. Nor has our Fellowship ever publicly taken sides in any question in an embattled world. This, however, has been no earned virtue . . . As by some deep instinct, we AA's have known from the very beginning that we must never, no matter what the provocation, publicly take sides in any fight, even a worthy one. ... That is the spiritual climate in which A.A. was born, and by God's grace has nevertheless flourished. ...Others fell apart because of a sheer self-righteousness while trying to enforce upon the rest of mankind some millennium of their own specification. We conceive the survival and spread of Alcoholics Anonymous to be something of far greater importance than the weight we could collectively throw back of any other cause.

I am grateful that the energies of AA have never been scattered, but focused instead on our members and on individual sobriety . . . Unless these attributes are well defined; unless those holding the final authority are able and willing properly to delegate and maintain a suitable operational authority; unless those holding such delegated authority feel able and willing to use their delegated authority freely as trusted servants; and unless there exists some definite means of interpreting and deciding doubtful situations — then personal clashes, confusion, and ineffectiveness will be inevitable.
