
QUOTE OF THE MONTH

If she's wrong, then she will-if she remembers the First Tradition as well as the Second-go along with the decision of the group conscience. Does this notion seem too cloudy? Let's think back to our first meetings. The presence we newcomers felt in those rooms was the same as the group conscience. And it was real-welcoming us in, setting up no barriers of rules...

I will lift my face in a smile instead of a frown.


I will remember fondly the warmth of hugging another.






Fourth Step

Alcoholics especially should be able to see that instinct run wild in themselves is the underlying cause of their destructive drinking. We have drunk to drown feelings of fear, frustration, and depression. We have drunk to escape the guilt of passions, and then have drunk again to make more passions possible. We have drunk for vain-glory - that we might the more enjoy foolish dreams of pomp and power. This perverse soulsickness is not pleasant to look upon. Instincts on rampage balk at investigation. The minute we make a serious attempt to probe them, we are liable to suffer severe reactions.

But in A.A. we slowly learned that something had to be done about our vengeful resentments, self-pity, and unwarranted pride. We had to see that every time we played the big shot, we turned people against us. We had to see that when we harbored grudges and planned revenge for such defeats, we were really beating ourselves with the club of anger we had intended to use on others. We learned that if we were seriously disturbed, our *first* need was to quiet that disturbance, regardless of who or what we thought caused it.

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Fourth Tradition

As always, freedom brings responsibility. Because each group is autonomous, it's up to each group to avoid any action that might harm A.A. And there *have* been such actions - or this Tradition would be unnecessary.

"Implicit throughout A.A.'s Traditions," Bill W. wrote, "is the confession that our Fellowship has its sins. We admit that we have character defects as a society and these defects threaten us continually."

In a way, the Fourth Tradition is like the Fourth Step: It suggests that the A.A. group should take honest inventory of itself, asking about each of its independently planned actions, "Would this break any Tradition?" Like the individual member who chooses to make the Steps his or her guide toward happy sobriety, the wise group recognizes that the Traditions are not hindering technicalities - they are proved guides toward the chief objective of all A.A. groups.

Step Five

All of A.A.'s Twelve Steps ask us to go contrary to our natural desires...they all deflate our egos. When it comes to ego deflations, few Steps are harder to take than Five. But scarcely any Step is more necessary to longtime sobriety and peace of mind than this one.

A.A. experience has taught us we cannot live alone with our pressing problems and the character defects which cause or aggravate them. If we have swept the searchlight of Step Four back and forth over our careers, and it has revealed in stark relief those experiences we'd rather not remember, if we have come to know how wrong thinking and action have hurt us and others, then the need to quit living by ourselves with those tormenting ghosts of yesterday gets more urgent than ever. We have to talk to somebody about them.

So intense, though, is our fear and reluctance to do this, that many A.A.'s at first try to bypass Step Five. We search for an easier way—which usually consists of the general and fairly painless admission that when drinking we were sometimes bad actors.


Fifth Tradition

...better do one thing supremely well than many badly. That is the central theme of this Tradition. Around it our Society gathers in unity. The very life of our Fellowship requires the preservation of this principle. Alcoholics Anonymous can be likened to a group of physicians who might find a cure for cancer, and upon whose concerted work would depend the answer for sufferers of this disease. True, each physician in such a group might have his own specialty. Every doctor concerned would at times wish he could devote himself to his chosen field rather than work only with the group. But once these men had hit upon a cure, once it became apparent that only by their united effort could this be accomplished, then all of them would feel bound to devote themselves solely to the relief of cancer. In the radiance of such a miraculous discovery, any doctor would set his other ambitions aside, at whatever personal cost.





Step Six

“WERE ENTIRELY READY TO HAVE GOD REMOVE ALL THESE DEFECTS OF CHARACTER.”

“This is the Step that separates the men from the boys.” So declares a well-loved clergyman who happens to be one of A.A.’s greatest friends. He goes on to explain that any person capable of enough willingness and honesty to try repeatedly Step Six on all his faults- *Without any reservations whatever-* has indeed come a long way spiritually, and is therefore entitled to be called a man who is sincerely trying to grow in the image and likeness of his own Creator.

Of course, the often disputed question of whether God can - and will, under certain conditions - remove defects of character will be answered with a prompt affirmative by almost any A.A. member. To him, this proposition will be no theory at all; it will be just about the largest fact in his life.

In A.A. meetings all over the world, statements just like this are heard daily. It is plain for everybody to see that each sober A.A. member has been granted a release from this very obstinate and potentially fatal obsession.

Sixth Tradition

An A.A. group ought never endorse, finance or lend the A.A. name to any related facility or outside enterprise, lest problems of money, property and prestige divert us from our primary purpose.

The “related facility” may be an outside group combating alcoholism - or an enterprise that A.A.’s want to start. It was the latter that most often confronted the young Fellowship. Outside agencies were pretty scarce in those days, and some members thought A.A. should cover the whole alcoholism field. Led by a “super-promoter” (as the “Twelve and Twelve” describes him), one group built an all-purpose center, including a section for drying-out treatment. Picture any group tackling such a project! Argument over cost, architecture, staff, fees, medication, and rules might even make the local paper. (And pity the poor newcomer straying into the group- “We’ll get around to you in a minute.”)

Though that ambitious center failed, some individual members have since founded successful club-houses, rest farms, halfway houses, etc. The enterprises are run by these A.A.’s and patronized by other members or prospective members. But money and property *are* involved. Therefore, it has proved wise to keep the operation of the facility completely separate from that of any A.A. group, and to keep “A.A.” or terms like “Twelfth Step” out of the name.

The words "Let's keep it simple" were the last Bill W. heard from his fellow founder of A.A., shortly before Dr. Bob's death in 1950. Aware that "it" meant our recover program, Bill later wrote, "We need to distinguish sharply between spiritual simplicity and functional simplicity. When we get into questions of action by groups, by areas, and by A.A. as a whole, we find that we must to some extent organize to carry the message - or else face chaos. And chaos is not simplicity."

When Tradition Nine speaks of "A.A. as such," it goes to the heart of A.A. experience, to the "spiritual simplicity" of one alcoholic's saying, silently perhaps, "Help!" and another alcoholic's answering, "I know how you feel. We're here to help you."

Such a relationship couldn't be organized. Or could it?

A nonmember familiar with modern business procedures might examine the A.A. practice of sponsorship and see it as a haphazard operation. How about computerizing it? Then an A.A. behind an intergroup desk might say, "So you want help? First, you need the right sponsor. We have personality profiles of all our sponsors fed into our computer. We'll match you up to the best one for you if you'll just fill out this questionnaire..... Where are you going? Come back!"

But in "action by groups" we find that we do need some degree of organization. If everybody thinks somebody else is going to make coffee, what's the result? No coffee! To avoid such a disaster, one or more members agree to be responsible for preparing meeting refreshments. All the way from coffee-brewers to trustees on the General Service Board, those who take part in A.A. service work are assuming responsibility - not taking on authority. (Here, Traditions Two and Nine interlock.) Group officers are responsible to the members of the group; intergroup committees, to the groups in one locality; institutions committees, to A.A. groups in treatment facilities and correctional facilities; area committees, to all groups in their areas; Conference delegates and committees, to all groups in the U.S. and Canada; the General Service Office and Board and the board's committees, to all groups and members everywhere.

In an average business corporation, the board has final power to determine company plans and policy. Our board of trustees serves in a custodial capacity; trustees vote at the Conference - but as individuals, with one vote apiece. In industry, branch offices jump when the home office speaks. Our G.S.O. is just a clearinghouse of A.A. information, offering suggestions based on experience reported to it by groups.

Step Nine
Made direct amends to such people wherever possible, except when to do so would injure them or others.

'Fear Gave Way to Faith'

"Good judgment, a careful sense of timing, courage, and prudence - these are the qualities we shall need when we take Step Nine." So says the opening paragraph on Step Nine from the "Twelve and Twelve."

Because I am a "normal" alcoholic my first response to Step Nine was to postpone doing it until tomorrow. Not only did I want to postpone it but I also had a tendency to turn the rest of the program into an obstacle course. However, despite having to negotiate this obstacle course of my own making, I had already experienced some of the miracle that is Alcoholics Anonymous. Had I not somehow managed the impossible - stopped drinking "one day at a time"? I had been around long enough to know that perhaps I was not hopeless. I knew that I was committed. In fact, I was prepared to go to any length to get what the program had to offer. Eventually I found myself facing the very real challenge of making direct amends.

I would like at this point to share something with you which accurately illustrates some of what it was like for me. There was a period during my drinking when the family stopped talking directly to me and in fact addressed what they wanted to say to me to one another. Being a drunk is confusing enough without having to decide what comments were in fact meant for me. There was a clue however and that was that by now everyone referred to me as "it." The conversations were a little like this: "How does she put up with it?"

"How does it keep it's job?" "Never mind, it will kill itself in its motor car one of these days." When people from Alcoholics Anonymous came to our house one night they were met at the front door by my wife and informed, "It is in the third bedroom." By God's grace, "It" stumbled into Alcoholics Anonymous and now stood on the threshold of Step Nine. There could be no more evasion. The time had come to accept the full consequences of my past acts. What was the real fear? Rejection or maybe just embarrassment? Who would believe me anyhow? Had it not all happened before? I had said "I'm sorry" a thousand times and promised to change. Would I be able to effect this change? The Big Book says you have to live a spiritual program. If we are painstaking about this phase, we'll have a new peace and a new happiness - two commodities that had been absent from my life for many years.

But the real stumbling block was my late mother. My father had died when I was seven years old - old enough to know that there was a problem in our home to do with drinking. My mother sacrificed all of her life for her three children and gave us all the love a mother can give. After eighteen years of sobriety I am still haunted by those last few months of her life. She had lived long enough to know that her eldest son had followed in his father's footsteps and that the problem was booze. I still vividly remember visiting my mother in various hospitals. I never managed a sober visit. I remember that most times I did not have the time to spend the whole of the visiting period with her.

I generally came late and left early. She died before I came to Alcoholics Anonymous. Over the years, I have come to terms with this. But in those quiet secret moments I share with God, the hurt remains.

The other amends sometimes seem not to matter as much. But I had to examine the real purpose of Step Nine, to try to do something about the relations in my life. The major portion of my amends was owed to my wife. She had stuck with me, suffered with and for me, through all of my worst times. There had been tears, disappointment, and unhappiness. The dreams of a young marriage had become a nightmare.

Disappointment and regret had made me self-pitying and stubbornly angry. The real risk might only be ridicule and dented pride. But Alcoholics Anonymous asks of me a manner of living which demands rigorous honesty: self-survey, confession and restitution, in that order.

What had begun as a venture into the unknown was soon to become a revelation for me. Fear gave way to faith and with God's help and guidance my dilemma was to become yet another wonderful experience in sobriety. Despite my own misgivings it was possible for me to practice humility and to say with sincerity and to mean it, "I was wrong and I am sorry."

I know from my own experience that I have been able to acquire three personal attributes from the program that I did not have before - namely: self-control, self-discipline, and self-sacrifice. I know of no other Step which demands more of me, in terms of these three attributes, than Step



Lost and Found

Several years ago, prior to getting sober, I was deer hunting in west Tennessee with a friend of mine. During the course of the day's hunt, we got separated from each other and I suddenly realized I was lost. I had absolutely no idea of how to find my way back to my car. Panic set in and I began to wander aimlessly through the dense forest looking for a familiar landmark or a logging trail that would lead me to the highway. I was no longer interested in hunting for deer, I only wanted out of that forest. Several hours later - exhausted, scared, and hungry - I emerged from the trees onto the highway just a few feet from my car. The relief I felt was immense. One day while meditating, I happened to recall this dilemma in the forest and I realized that when I don't know where I'm going, it's usually because I don't know where I am. Consequently, I get diverted from the important things. Instead of building, creating, and working towards goals, I revert to merely coping. For me, it is necessary to maintain a constant spiritual point of reference. This means doing an honest daily inventory.

The first time I realized the importance of the Tenth Step, I was standing in front of a judge on a charge of driving while intoxicated. I had been found guilty in two lower courts but had appealed both decisions. I'd rationalized that I was innocent because I'd been a victim of entrapment. The judge proved to be no less wise than the others.

Not only was I found guilty, I was given extra jail time and fined an additional five hundred dollars. I'd been sober for over three months before this final trial took place and I had let fear and pride stop men from admitting my guilt. That painful experience took place over eight years ago and today I am still having trouble with Step Ten. The admissions today, however, are not quite as dramatic as the drunk driving issue. Today the issues are ego, resentments, control, and being judgmental. The prices I pay for neglecting my Tenth Step are anger, loss of serenity, and loss of spiritual direction. I know that if I am remiss in working this Step, I will eventually build a formidable wall of darkness around myself that shuts me off from the sunlight of the spirit of God.

The Tenth Step helps me remain in the present. By immediately dealing with my daily problems and avoiding a buildup of emotional trash, I avoid the anxiety and stinking thinking that can result from procrastination. One day at a time is still a way of life for me. I only have today. Yesterday is history and tomorrow is only an illusion, but if I am diligent and honest in my daily inventory, tomorrow will surely bring new opportunities for which I will be prepared. I have a goal which, I am sorry to say, I've only been able to achieve with varying degrees of success. That goal is unconditional love for my fellow man. I guess I am still carrying too much emotional garbage around to be able to accept others just as they are. I've made lots of progress in this area but my ego still keeps me as its mercy.

At least I have some idea of what the problem is and can use the Tenth Step as a powerful tool in my struggle toward spiritual progress. That - along with the help of a forgiving God, a loving wife, and a sponsor who seems to be able to accept me as I am - gives me hope. Without hope, I would surely drink again.

To most of us, Alcoholics Anonymous has become as solid as the Rock of Gibraltar. We like to believe that it will soon be as well-known and just as enduring as that historic landmark. We enjoy this pleasant conviction because nothing has yet occurred to disturb it; we reason that we must hang together or die. Hence we take for granted our continued unity as a movement. But should we? Though God has bestowed upon us great favors, and though we are bound by stronger ties of love and necessity than most societies, is it prudent to suppose that automatically these great gifts and attributes shall be ours forever? If we are worthy, we shall probably continue to enjoy them. So the real question is, how shall we always be worthy of our present blessings?

Seen from this point of view, our AA Traditions are those attitudes and practices by which we may deserve, as a movement, a long life and a useful one. To this end, none could be more vital than our Tenth Tradition, for it deals with the subject of controversy - serious controversy. On the other side of the world, millions of have died even recently in religious dissension. Other millions have died in political controversy. The end is not yet. Nearly everybody in the world has turned reformer. Each group, society and nation is saying to the other, "You must do as we say, or else." Political controversy and reform by compulsion have reached an all-time high.

And certainly, seemingly, are the flames of religious dissension. Being like other men and women, how can we expect to remain forever immune from these perils? Probably we shall not. At length, we must meet them all. We cannot flee from them, nor ought we try. If these challenges do come, we shall, I am sure, go out to meet them gladly and unafraid. That will be the acid test of our worth. Our best defense? This surely lies in the formation of a Tradition respecting serious controversy so powerful that neither the weakness of persons nor the strain and strife of our troubled times can harm Alcoholics

Anonymous. We know that AA must continue to live, or else many of us and many of our fellow alcoholics throughout the world will surely resume the hopeless journey to oblivion. That must never be.

As though by some deep and compelling instinct, we have thus far avoided serious controversies. Save minor and healthy growing pains, we are at peace among ourselves. And because we have thus far adhered to our sole aim, the whole world regards us favorably.

May God grant us the wisdom and fortitude ever to sustain an unbreakable unity.

INTERGROUPS

An Intergroup (or central office) is an A.A. service office that involves partnership among groups in a community - just as A.A. groups themselves are partnerships of individuals. It is established to carry out certain functions common to all groups - functions which are best handled by a centralized office - and it is usually maintained, supervised and supported by these groups in their general interest. It exists to aid the groups in their common purpose of carrying the A.A. message to the alcoholic who still suffers.

There are 500 intergroups world wide.

Intergroup 17 is the service area of the 40 Groups in Marion county. It satisfies the interests of the groups and carries out its A.A. mission in the following ways:

Publishes a quarterly directory of the more than 90 A.A. meeting held weekly in the service area.

Publishes the "VOICE", a newsletter of local, state and national A.A. activities and of items of specific interest to the A.A. community

Operates a 5 day, 8 hour office providing personal and telephone communications about A.A. activities and services.

Contracts a 24 hour 7 day A. A. inquiry answering service providing A.A. information for times when the Intergroup office is not attended.

Purchases, stocks and sells specific A.A. literature and other appropriate merchandise.

Has committees which schedule and conduct various social activities such as dances, picnics, holiday parties and outdoor recreational events.

Cooperates with other related organizations to sponsor, conduct and promote training and informational seminars.

Cooperates with other A.A. organizations, the professional community, schools, correctional facilities, treatment centers and medical facilities to provide information about A.A.

Assists the press and other public media in development of articles and general publicity about A.A.

The VOICE will contain future articles about how Intergroup 17 is organized, how it functions, what are its supporting needs, how to take advantage of the many Intergroup 17 services, how Intergroup 17 relates to other AA organizations

Our public relations policy is based on attraction rather than promotion; we need always maintain personal anonymity at the level of press, radio, and films.

Alcoholics who have recovered through our program are themselves the strongest attraction that A.A. has. When people are asked what led them to seek A.A. help, the answer given most often is: "An A.A. member." Their chances would have been slim if all of us had remained completely in hiding. But many of us have chose to tell our friends, neighbors, employers, co-workers, doctors, or spiritual advisers that we are in A.A. — and when we do so, we are not breaking our anonymity in the meaning of this Tradition.

Suppose a sick alcoholic has the good fortune to meet an A.A. How is such a person going to find us? The search will be difficult if the local group thinks it should be anonymous, too. The Tradition is talking about "personal anonymity," remember? Alcoholics will not be to A.A. if they don't know that it exists or if they have distorted, unfavorable impressions of its members or its program. Giving the general public an accurate picture of A.A. is the chief job of our public information committees. In addition, they often carry the message to certain groups — from police officers to personnel directors — whose work includes contact with active alcoholics.

Step 11

Sought through prayer and meditation to improve our conscious contact with God as we understood Him, praying only for the knowledge of His will for us and the power to carry that out.

Conscious Contact

When I first joined AA I was an atheist and unable to pray. After attending ninety meeting in ninety days, I knelt by my bed one morning and in tearful frustration pounded with my fists and cried, "If you are up there, if there is a God, help me!" In the days to follow I tried to meditate and pray but I really didn't know how. Like many newcomers, the idea of meditation or prayer seemed too esoteric to me, something only priests or pastors could do. Gradually I was able to learn through much practice, to "let go and let God." But it took some doing!

There are many techniques and methods of meditation, from saying the rosary to doing Yoga asana. Inward repetition of a prayer or a mantra is one way. There is always some self-discipline involved, but it does work. One way or another, one's emotional balance and stimulated intuition begin to stir. My way is consciously to relax each muscle in my body, one by one, sitting in a straight chair, breathing deeply while rolling my eyes back under closed lids and feeling my body heavy against the chair, my hands loose in my lap. I control my desire to look at the clock and I ignore "drunken monkey thoughts." I pay attention to how I am feeling. If I am angry or resentful, I

pay attention to that. If I don't know "what to do today," I look at that and I ask God to send me answers. Perhaps today I should do nothing but go to a meeting. If I empty myself and let God in it is working. Gradually a sense of freedom and light permeates my being. Clarity and love of God are there and fear departs. The process does not need to be understood to allow it to happen. Later, when I open my eyes, what a sensation it is to look around me and see that nothing has changed. I am still in the same body, the same room, the same house, the same world. But I have acquired conscious contact with God as I understand him. I can pause during the day for only a second, and ask for help, or say "Thank you!" God goes with me all day. Now I turn my life and will over to him every morning. (I have been sober thirteen years.)

Step Eleven is the maintenance I need to expand my awareness





It is established to carry out certain functions common to all groups - functions which are best handled by a centralized office - and it is usually maintained, supervised and supported by these groups in their general interest. It exists to aid groups in carrying the A.A. message to the alcoholic who still suffers."



Having had a spiritual awakening as the result of these Steps, we tried to carry this message to alcoholics, and to practice these principles in all our affairs.

When Other Activities Fail

The Big Book devotes two chapters (five & six) to the first Eleven Steps. The Twelfth Step gets a chapter all its own - one whose fifteen pages, in comparison to the thirty-one pages that covered all the previous Steps, is disproportionately long. The significance of this imbalance is made clear at the start of that chapter: "...nothing will so much insure immunity from drinking as intensive work with other alcoholics. It works when other activities fail."

This is the major reason for the strong emphasis on this Step; and in fact, many of the Big Book's personal stories tell us that Bill W. and Dr. Bob lost no time in having new recruits go out to spread the word.

But what exactly constitutes Twelfth Step work? What might such work include?

Since the Big Book was written just a few short years after AA began, and at a time when most people had not even heard about us, its discussion of twelfth-stepping emphasized the importance of bringing our message of hope to those who were still actively suffering from the disease. The classic AA images of twelfth-stepping — going to hospitals and talking to alcoholics who are drying out, or going with another member to the home of a drinking person who calls for help —

were thereby formed. Some present-day AAs have these kinds of images in mind when they say that they are not yet ready to do Twelfth Step work or that they are not particularly suited for it.

Yet, to neglect Twelfth Step work is to ignore an important tool for one's own recovery — a tool that will not only work "when other activities fail," but also one through which "life will take on new meaning." For everyone in recovery — and not just those who have the talent for helping the active alcoholic — what the Twelfth Step means needs to be carefully considered.

My sponsor recently said to me, "Recovery depends on being of loving service to other people." What better antidote for the alcoholic's self-will run riot than a life in which obsession with self is replaced by loving concern for others no less than for oneself? Sometimes, I have distorted the idea of ours being a "selfish program" and have made it instead into a self-obsessed program; though I may not be drinking, I am at those times as self-willed as I was during my drinking days. "Loving service" is my way of fighting self-will. It is, in the last analysis, what the Twelfth Step is all about.

Working effectively with still-drinking persons or those in very early recovery is not what all of us can do since it often requires a special talent of a kind of strength which we don't all have. It can be a wise policy to leave that type of work to others more suited to it. Yet, even if that form of twelfth-stepping is not what I

can do, it is important for me to recognize that is only one form in which the Twelfth Step can be practiced; the spirit of loving service is not restricted to just one kind of service.

How can the Twelfth Step be practiced? Putting it simply, Twelfth Step work is any service to other alcoholics, and indeed to all who need such service (for the Twelfth Step reminds us to practice the principles in all our affairs). There is, however, one important qualification: the work must be primarily motivated by the love of others, rather than by gain, or by the desire to be admired, or by some other self-seeking and self-centered motive.

Traditon Twelve

Anonymity is the spiritual foundation of all our Traditions, ever reminding us to place principles before personalities.

In a recent professional training meeting, I had goosebump-raising emotions when I realized that of the six people in the room, three of us were members of Alcoholics Anonymous - but the other two AAs didn't know it. They know each other in the business world - but not in AA. As it happens, they go to different meetings and each man protects his anonymity at the public level.

That evening, as I was reviewing my day and feeling grateful, I decided to reflect on my personal experiences with anonymity and Traditions Eleven and Twelve. Early in my sobriety, my personal anonymity was very important. Even though my name had been in the paper a number of times for alcohol-related offenses, the fear of stigma and discrimination still worked in my mind, just as it works in newcomers' minds today - and as it did in the early years of Alcoholics Anonymous.

In my early years in AA, I read a lot. I read "Why Alcoholics Anonymous Is Anonymous" by Bill W. and Harry Tiebouts's "When the Big I Becomes Nobody" from early Grapevines. Both articles helped me to see the need for "ego deflation at depth." I was aware of the dangers egocentrism, the bondage of self. I began to feel the need to mix in, to be one among many. I was a schoolteacher when I came to AA. It didn't take long for my principal to see the beginning of a change in my life. He became curious, and when he

asked what I was doing, I told him I was going to AA. He was cautiously enthusiastic. He remembered how often he had given his "the-next-time-your-name-is-in-the-papers" warning. My professional career has improved as I have been restored to sanity, though it didn't happen without soul pain and ups and downs.

I have also felt the lash of stigma. My feelings were hurt when I lost out in the last stage of an interview process. I entered the room for my final interview with the school board and the chairman said, "Something has come up." I knew they had learned about my drinking career. Sixteen years of sobriety, excellent recommendations, and training to doctorate level did not convince the board to reconsider my application. I was still a drunk in their eyes. It hurt, but I tried to keep one foot in front of the other - spiritually.

Today, I am superintendent of schools in my community. During the interview with my present board, I tried to sell myself as a professional educator first. Thereafter, I revealed my history and my membership in AA. With this board, it worked to my credit, but I still remembered the sting of "Something has come up."

My anonymity continues to be an important check on my character defects. I share my sobriety willingly as my Higher Power leads me. I have enjoyed helping colleagues who have lost their licenses come to AA and regain their professional standing. (My help name got on a list of helpers through a break of my anonymity.)

I look forward to the day when my two business friends see each

other at a meeting and the three of us can enjoy coffee and laughter in the "meeting after the meeting."

It will come in their time, not mine, as the spiritual foundation allows.
