One member's voice Growing with God A story of experience, strength, and hope

"Sought through prayer and meditation to improve our conscious contact with God as we understood Him, praying only for knowledge of His will for us and the power to carry that out."

After completion of the first ten steps I was certainly feeling God's presence in my life to much relief. Step Eleven helps keep me close to my Higher Power on a daily basis. I need to stay as close as possible to God in spirit, so I can do His will and not mine.

I do this by practicing Step Eleven each and every day, like I do many of the other steps. In order for God to do for me what I cannot do for myself, I must grow

closer and improve my conscious contact through prayer and meditation. Here are a few tips on how I improve my conscious contact with God.

First, at the end of each day I review my daily behavior. Is there a need to make any apologies? Was I selfish today, or was I thinking of others? I have to ask myself if I was kind and loving or not? Where could I improve my interactions with others?

After a look, I ask God to forgive me where I was wrong, and I ask Him to guide me to His will for the future. This pattern seems to help change some of my foolish behavior habits of the past. Next, each morning I sit quietly in my dimly lit living room and slowly, gradually wake up with God on my mind. I thank Him for creating me; I praise His name for relieving me from the pits of alcoholism.

My prayer consists of asking my Higher Power to direct my thinking for the day. I ask that His will be done and not mine. And by asking for His will, it helps keep me away from all of my self-pity, fears, and ill planned motives.

As long as I follow His will, things go great. It's when I go to my closet, get out my "Superman cape," and take my wrong intuitions into my hands that the *Continued page 3*

STEP ELEVEN

Sought through prayer and meditation to improve our conscious contact with God as we understood him, praying only for knowledge of His will for us and the power to carry that out.

My first sponsor told me there were two things to say about prayer and meditation; first, I had to start and second, I had to continue. When it came to A.A. my spiritual life was bankrupt; if I considered God at all, He was to be called upon only when my self-will was incapable of a task or when overwhelming fears had eroded my ego.

Today I am grateful for a new life, one in which my prayers are those of thanksgiving. My prayer time is more for listening than for talking. I know today that I cannot change the wind, I can adjust my sail. I know the difference between superstition and spirituality. I know there is a graceful way to be right and many ways to be wrong.

Our public relations policy is based on attraction rather than promotion; we need always maintain personal anonymity at the level of press, radio and films.
