## Stepping into the sunlight

#### A story of experience, strength, and hope

"Made a list of all persons we had harmed, and became willing to make amends to them all."

As I did the work necessary for me to stay sober, I was not aware of the ultimate spiritual benefits that would change my life forever. I worked Step Eight in a simplistic manner at first, only concentrating on the people I had listed in my fourth step. I was told by my sponsor that the most important part of understanding Step Eight was the encompassing ALL word. That meant not all of the people I had harmed had engendered fear or resentments in me, nor were all of them involved in my sexual life.

My step book—Twelve Steps and

Twelve Traditions—reminded me that to do Step Eight, I had to redouble my efforts and be much more thorough in finding those who had suffered physical, mental, and spiritual harm as a result of my alcoholism. I have heard many people in AA say that sometimes we get too complicated, but I have found that in the working of the eighth and ninth steps, intensive digging and rigorous soul searching are the key to a peaceful happy life.

My first time working these steps I was more self-serving than the steps intended. I have since found that the intent of this step was and is for me to recognize my destructive behavior patterns towards my fellows, and then to

## Somebody answer that phone. Please!

My personal road to recovery started with a mid-morning phone call to 352-867-0660—the Intergroup 17 hotline. A friendly voice answered, and said, "Alcoholics Anonymous, can I help you?" I blurted out something like, "I want to stop drinking, but I don't know how." And then I started to cry.

I'll never know who was on the other end of the line that day, but she reassured me that there was a way out, asked a few questions, chatted with me briefly, and directed me to an upcoming meeting nearby. She also asked if I needed transportation

portation or if I wanted someone to talk to

or to visit me right away.

The phone call was brief and simple, but somehow I found the determination to make it to the meeting at the appointed place and time. I found what I was looking for in that room.

The very group where I attended my first meeting has been my home group now for more than two-and-a-half years. It hasn't all been so simple and easy, but I date my sobriety to that phone call and to that individual whose willingness to serve as a volunteer at Intergroup 17 literally saved my life.

### Sixty Years Later and Never More Timely or Important

Throughout the world AAs are "12th stepping" with thousands of new prospects a month. Almost entirely unorganized, and completely non-professional, this mighty spiritual current is now flowing from alcoholics who are well to those who are sick. One alcoholic talking to another; that's all.

Could this vast and vital face-to -face effort ever be professionalized or even organized? Most emphatically, it could not. The few efforts to professionalize straight "12th Step" work have always failed quickly. But what about those who serve us full time in other capacities—are cooks, caretakers, and paid Intergroup secretaries "AA professionals"?

The impression of professionalism subtly attaches to them, so we frequently hear they are "making money out of AA," or that they are "professionalizing" AA. We sometimes go further; we underpay them on the theory they ought to be glad to "cook" for AA cheap.

Now isn't this carrying our fears of professionalism rather far? We are beginning to see that our few paid workers are performing



only those service tasks that our volunteers cannot consistently handle. Primarily these folks are not doing 12th Step work. They are just making more and better 12th Step work possible.

Secretaries at their desks are valuable points of contact, informa-

tion, and public relations. That is what they are paid for, and nothing else. They help carry the good news of AA to the outside world and bring our prospects face to face with us. That's not "AA therapy;" it's just a lot of very necessary but often thankless work.

So, where needed, let's revise our attitude toward those who labor at our special services. Let us treat them as AA associates, and not as hired help; let's recompense them fairly and, above all, let's absolve them from the label of professionalism.

Let us also distinguish clearly between "organizing the AA movement" and setting up, in a reasonably business-like manner, its few essential services of contact and propagation. Once we do that, all will be well. Let's give our "service desks" the hand they so well deserve.

### August by the Books

#### STEP EIGHT

"Made a list of all persons we had harmed, and became willing to make amends to them all."

... "Faith without works is dead." ... "We have a list of all persons we have harmed and to whom we are willing to make amends. We made it when we made our inventory. We subjected ourselves to drastic self-appraisal. Now we go out to our fellows and repair the damage done in the past. We attempt to sweep away the debris which has accumulated out of our effort to live on self-will and run the show ourselves. If we haven't the will to do this, we ask until it comes. Remember it was agreed at the beginning we would go to any lengths for victory over alcohol. ... Our real purpose is to fit ourselves to be of maximum service to God and the people about us."

#### TRADITION EIGHT

"Alcoholics Anonymous should remain forever non-professional, but our service centers may employ special workers."

"Alcoholics Anonymous will never have a professional class. ... Alcoholics simply will not listen to a paid twelve –stepper. Almost from the beginning, we have been positive that face-to-face work with the alcoholic who still suffers could be based only on the desire to help and be helped.... Our Twelfth Step is never to be paid for, but those who labor in service for us are worthy of their hire."

#### **CONCEPT EIGHT**

"The Trustees of the General Service Board act in two primary capacities: (a) with respect to larger matters of overall policy and finance, they are the principal planners and administrators. They and their primary committees directly manage these affairs. (b) But with respect to our separately incorporate and constantly active services, the relation of the Trustees is mainly that of full stock ownership and custodial oversight which they exercise through their ability to elect all directors of these entities."

### Brotherly Love. The Principle behind Step Eight.

In the practice of our program in Step 8, we embark on the "outward journey" making amends to people we have harmed by our alcoholism—whether while drinking or not. The principle of Brotherly Love is put into practical application when we are asked to look only at our part, and not at our brother's "derelictions" at all.

We discover to "love a brother" is easy with someone who hasn't crossed us, but not so easy with those who caused us harm. Here our defenses rise, and our ego collaborates to deflect a big portion of the blame on them.

Whether verbalized or only in thought, this harboring of blame does not help us achieve our goal of peace and true tolerance. Indeed it will not allow us to fully love our brother or sister as God intends us to—thereby blocking the sunlight of the spirit.

In my practice, looking at my part was necessary for me to grow in spiritual understanding. With a goal of "seeing with God's vision," I slowly saw that many of the negative actions or attitudes others had toward me actually began with my own selfish or ego-driven actions or attitudes toward them.

In deeper spiritual application of Brotherly Love, I saw that even if derelictions do fall to my brother or sister, that they, like me, are growing spiritually and learning at their own pace. As God's children, they are due every bit of acceptance, tolerance, and understanding that I wish conferred upon me.

In the end, Brotherly Love is a whole lot about loving others as we would love ourselves. We can and should make good choices about our future actions, and even if we may feel that we cannot "hang" with certain folks, we can still love them unconditionally for their spiritual potential and their equal birthright as a worthy child of God. This practice will surely heal our own hearts and draw more of the goodness we desire into our lives.

follow up with action in trying to restore me to sanity in my relationships.

I read a wonderful book in which the author describes sobriety as a "spiritual rest!" I have found that there can be no true spiritual rest unless Step Eight is done. It is rather difficult to discuss Step Eight without wandering into the ninth step as well. *Alcoholics Anonymous*, our *Big Book*, tells us that in working the first nine steps "we have entered the world of the spirit."

In the world of the spirit, forgiveness rules supreme, and it is in Step Eight that I began to seek forgiveness spiritually. It is impossible to stop fighting anything and anybody without doing eighth-step work.

Thank God our program states that we claim spiritual progress rather than spiritual perfection. I know that the first time I worked Step Eight, it was the beginning of my journey into learning how to love my fellow man. Prior to the program, I never saw or understood the way my speech and actions affected others. By the time I was able to work Step Eight, I was starting to become aware of others, and that is the essence of Steps Eight and Nine.

These steps require a great deal of willingness. I once asked my sponsor, "How do I become willing?" He said, "You become willing by doing." Nothing epitomizes this greater than the working of the fourth and fifth steps and the eighth and ninth. These are the steps that start to teach me forgiveness of myself and others.

I have found that many people have long-term sobriety, and yet are unhappy and angry. The reason, I think, is the shorting of step-work in this area. The *Big Book* chapter, "How It Works," says, "Half measures avail us nothing." My experi-

ence with Step Eight tells me this is certainly true.

I found that Step Eight was indeed a second inventory pointing out my character defects in relations with others. I know today that in the early workings of Step Eight, I was just beginning to touch the surface of my twisted thinking concerning how I viewed my fellow man. I did this step because I did not want to drink, later I did it because I did not want to hurt.

I know today that as I took Step Eight, I subconsciously worried about making amends. That was a barrier I had to overcome if I were to be really set free. Step Eight for me was truly the opening that allowed me to step into the sunlight of the spirit.
